

Five Things You May Not Know About Amelia Earhart

1. She Also Flew the Autogiro

In 1930, after only 15 minutes of instruction, Earhart became the first woman to fly an autogiro, made by Pitcairn and featuring rotating blades to increase lift and allow short takeoffs and landings. Earhart set the first autogiro altitude record and made two autogiro cross-country tours, which were marked by three public crashes. Though Earhart was the most famous woman pilot, she was not necessarily the most skilled.

2. First Woman Vice President of the National Aeronautic Association

Earhart became the first woman vice president of the National Aeronautic Association, which authorized official records and races. She persuaded the organization to establish separate female records because women did not have the money or planes — and thus the experience — to fairly compete against men for "world" titles.

3. Politically Outspoken

Earhart lobbied Congress for aviation legislation. She also lobbied for birth control rights, supported women in politics and business, and endorsed the draft for men, women, and even the elderly to promote equality and peace.

4. Entrepreneur and Fashion Designer

Earhart designed a line of "functional" women's clothing, including dresses, blouses, pants, suits, and hats, initially using her own sewing machine, dress form, and seamstress. She modeled her own designs for promotional spreads.

5. College Professor

In 1935, Earhart became a visiting professor at Purdue University at the invitation of Purdue president Edward Elliott, an advocate of higher education for women, especially in engineering and science. Earhart, a former premedical student, served as a counselor for women and a lecturer in aeronautics. Elliott was also interested in supporting Earhart's flying career and convinced Purdue benefactors to purchase a twin-engine Lockheed 10-E Electra for her.

Rachelle Reeg

July 10, 1933 - December 15, 2023 (90 years)

It is with great sadness that we are sharing the news of Rachelle Reeg's passing. Rachelle joined he Zonta Club of St. Louis in 1993 and achieved emeritus status several years ago. She was an engaged and productive club member.

Rachelle was born and raised in the "Hill" section of St. Louis and later lived most of her life in Affton, MO. As a young adult, she pursued a career in education. She became a teacher and eventually an administrator in public and Catholic elementary schools. Later she became

the House Manager for the historic Hawken House in Webster Groves. This is where she learned about Questers, a national organization focusing on local historic preservation.

In 1978 Rachelle, and her husband, became members of the Carondelet Y Service Club. Through her service there, the YMCA Book Fair came about. The couple took advantage of the wide international umbrella of the YMCA and travelled to gatherings in the United States and abroad. This experience led to Rachelle becoming the first women to serve as the President of Y's Men International (1990-91).

As a Zontian, Rachelle served locally, as well as on the district and international level. She was an active advocate in the development of he Zonta Club of St. Louis Undergraduate Student - endowed scholarship with the College of Education at UMSL She was also instrumental in the Women's Another Chance program being selected as a charity supported by Merchandise Pick-up Service (now Charity Clothing Pick-Up).

I think Rachelle summed it up nicely when she shared this in a Member Spotlight some years ago:

It is hard to tell when a "new member" becomes an "old member" in Zonta. The time from 1993, when I joined, until now is seamless. The joy of friendships and the value of Zonta service to others have replaced my "calendar thinking" with a kind of continuous self-enrichment.

A funeral mass will be held Saturday, 13 January 2024, 10:00 AM at St. Ambrose Catholic Church, 5130 Wilson Ave, St. Louis, MO 63110, preceded by visitation commencing 9:00 AM. Burial will follow at Resurrection Cemetery, 6901 Mackenzie Rd, St. Louis, MO 63123.

Senate passes IMPACTT Human Trafficking Act

In November, the Senate unanimously passed the bipartisan IMPACTT Human Trafficking Act (S. 670), which will enhance the Department of Homeland Security's ability to combat human trafficking, allowing survivors of human trafficking to receive improved support and providing law enforcement with more resources to combat these crimes. The bill is now under consideration in the House of Representatives. Click here to take action and ask your representative to support the bill.



Three states ended child marriage

There are now 10 states that have eliminated all marriages before the age of 18. In 2023, Vermont, Connecticut and Michigan passed laws to end child marriage.

If you live in one of the 40 states that still allow child marriage, <u>click here</u> to urge your state officials to pass legislation ending child marriage. According to Unchained At Last, bills that would end marriage before the age of 18 in Hawaii, Illinois, Kansas, South Carolina, and Washington are currently pending.


Overview of Missouri Marriage Age Requirement Laws

The "Show-Me" state previously allowed minors younger than 15 to get married "under special circumstances and for good cause." For example, a 14-year-old girl who is pregnant may meet the "special circumstances" requirement, but also must want to get married for "good cause." If the father is supportive and the marriage is in the best interests of the young family, then the court likely would grant a court order for the marriage license.

In July 2018, Missouri's governor signed a bill raising the minimum age of marriage with parental consent to 16. Applicants under the age of 16 must also obtain a circuit court order. Additionally, the bill prevents anyone 21 or older to marry someone under the age of 18. This <u>bill went into</u> effect in August 2018.
